## KMB receives state award for 'exceptional local impact'

Keep Manatee Beautiful (KMB) recently received statewide honors for its efforts to restore some of the most devastated areas of Manatee County following last year's brutal hurricane season.

At its annual conference in November, Keep

presented KMB executive director Jennifer Hoffman with the 2025 Project Award, recognizing an affiliate member that "has made an exceptional impact in a local community."

Keep Florida Beautiful Executive Director Sherry Carpenter, KMB Director Jennifer Hoffman and KMB Education Programs Manager Michele Laughrey at the Keep Florida Beautiful Conference in early November. Joined by volunteers from around Manatee County, KMB led the community effort to collect storm debris following the devastating impacts of Hurricanes Helene and Milton. Debris cleanup from those storms alone totaled more than 145,000 pounds and went towards KMB's record-setting

actions to collect 251,000 pounds (125.5 TONS!) of debris for the year. During the breakneck year of 2025, KMB organized 2,324 volunteers across 697 cleanups for a total of 7,320 volunteer hours locally.

"Keep Manatee Beautiful was selected for their extraordinary efforts in turning a devastating situation into a story of resilience and success," Carpenter said. "Recovering from hurricane damage is no easy task, yet Jennifer Hoffman and her team rose to the challenge without hesitation. Not only did they complete an impressive cleanup in record time, but

they continue to strengthen their community by restoring sea oats, replanting trees and promoting long-term environmental recovery across the region."

KMB also organized resiliency and restoration projects, including a July event when 300 volunteers planted more than 12,000 sea oats throughout Anna Maria Island. It was the largest dune restoration in Manatee County history, and it's helping to stabilize the shoreline against erosion from future storms.

Keep Manatee Beautiful also distributed 2,000 trees in 2025, and continues to give away more trees during the final Saturday of each month at the popular Downtown Bradenton Market.

This new initiative aims to meet them where they are, offering meaningful volunteer opportunities, pathways to earn service hours, and a platform for creative environmental advocacy. Whether it becomes a group that assists at cleanups,

helps lead school-based beautification efforts, develops peer-to-peer education, or creates youth-driven environmental campaigns, the possibilities are wide open – and that's what makes this so exciting.

For Keep Manatee Beautiful, this program represents more than a new project. It reflects our long-term commitment to sustainability, community stewardship, and building connections that last. Volunteers have always been the beating heart of our work, and engaging the next generation ensures that heart stays strong. When young people see their actions make a visible difference – a cleaner shoreline, a revitalized park, a restored habitat – they walk away with a sense of ownership and pride that often lasts a lifetime.

I also want to acknowledge the role you play in making initiatives like this possible. Your support – whether through volunteer time, financial contributions, or simply spreading the word about KMB's mission – gives us the flexibility to dream big and invest in programs that create long-term impact. A youth council does not just serve today's needs; it lays the foundation for tomorrow's leaders. In November, volunteers across Bradenton and Palmetto rolled up their sleeves to keep our community looking its best.

The **Bradenton Runners Club** hit the Riverwalk for an early-morning cleanup along Riverwalk Boulevard, where they collected hundreds of discarded cigarette butts – a small item that remains one of the most common and stubborn sources of litter in our waterfront parks.

Across the river in Palmetto, members of **Omega Psi Phi Fraternity** spent the day at Coach Eddie Shannon Park, tackling litter hidden in brush lines, around ballfields, and near playgrounds. Their efforts helped restore the park as a safe, welcoming space for families and kids who rely on it every day. By the end of the month, cleanup teams from the Cities of Bradenton and Palmetto had removed **more than 2,640 pounds of trash** from public spaces – a great reminder of what's possible when neighbors, civic groups, and community partners work together!
