Building in downtown Bradenton. If you've

along Manatee Avenue when you pass the
courthouse and judicial center.

Our new space is bright, comfortable, and welcoming — with an incredible view of the Manatee River that stretches all the way to the Sunshine Skyway Bridge and the skyline of St. Petersburg. It's a daily reminder of the beauty we work to protect and preserve here in Manatee County.

This move was made possible thanks to the county's recent purchase of a new office building in Lakewood Ranch, which prompted several departments to relocate and created an opportunity for us to settle into this beautiful space. 




SCENES FROM SEPTEMBER

SUSTAINABLE WAYS TO GIVE THANKS

IDEAS TO HELP YOU GO GREEN ON TURKEY DAY '25

CUT CARBS (CARBONS)

It's not always possible to avoid travel during the holidays, but when you do, consider carpooling, using public transportation, or even hosting a local Thanksgiving to reduce the carbon footprint.

SHOP LOCAL!

Support local farmers by buying produce that's in season. Local produce has a much smaller carbon footprint, but it's also fresher and often more flavorful. Thanksgiving favorites like sweet potatoes, squash and cranberries are often available at farmers' markets.

TRIM THE FAT

Overcooking is one of the biggest culprits of food waste.


Use a portion planner to calculate exactly how much food you need based on the number of guests. Aim for about 1.5 pounds of turkey per person, which accounts for bones and some leftovers but prevents cooking excess.



SAY NO TO SINGLE-USE PLASTICS

The EPA reports that Americans generate 25% more trash during the holidays, much of which is single-use plastics. Skip plastic utensils, plates, and cups this year. Opt for real, non-toxic dinnerware sets. That might mean more dishes to wash, but it's worth it!
